

A READING ATTRIBUTED TO MEISTER ECKHART (1260-1328)

Apprehend God in all things, for God is in all things. Every single creature is full of God and is a book about God. Every creature is a word of God. If I spent enough time with the tiniest creature—even a caterpillar—I would never have to prepare a sermon, so full of God is every creature.

Johannes Eckhart (c. 1260 - c. 1328) was a German Catholic theologian, philosopher and mystic well known for his work with pious lay groups such as the Friends of God. He has acquired a status as a great mystic within contemporary popular spirituality, as well as considerable interest from scholars situating him within the medieval scholastic and philosophical tradition.

"How could you worship two gods at the same time? You will have to hate one and love the other, or be devoted to one and despise the other. You can't worship the true God while enslaved to the god of money!" "This is why I tell you to never be worried about your life, for all that you need will be provided, such as food, water, clothing—everything your body needs. Isn't there more to your life than a meal? Isn't your body more than clothing? "Consider the birds—do you think they worry about their existence? They don't plant or reap or store up food, yet God provides them each with food. Aren't you much more valuable to God than they? So, which one of you by worrying could add anything to your life? "And why would you worry about your clothing? Look at all the beautiful flowers of the field. They don't work or toil, and yet not even Solomon in all his splendor was robed in beauty like one of these! So if God has clothed the meadow with hay, which is here for such a short time and then dried up and burned, won't he provide for you the clothes you need—you of little faith? "So then, forsake your worries! Why

would you say, 'What will we eat?' or 'What will we drink?' or 'What will we wear?' For that is what the unbelievers chase after. Doesn't God already know the things your bodies require? "So above all, constantly seek God's kingdom and righteousness, then all these less important things will be given to you abundantly. Refuse to worry about tomorrow, but deal with each challenge that comes your way, one day at a time. Tomorrow will take care of itself."







You may participate by extending your hands and placing one hand over the other for the bread and sipping from the chalice. Please let the priest know if you need a gluten free wafer. If you prefer not to receive wine, you may cross your hands over your chest. You may also come forward for a blessing, while others come for communion.

To receive a blessing, simply cross your arms over your chest. The Priest will pray for God's blessing upon you.

After Communion, you may come to the Altar railing and briefly describe to the healing minister, petitions or thanksgivings for which you would like prayers. You may kneel or stand, and if you would prefer not to be touched or anointed with oil, please so indicate. The minister will then offer a prayer and blessing.





CREATION CARE SUNDAY

2025 marks the 800th anniversary of St. Francis' "Canticle of the Creatures"

The poem is a song of praise to God through all of creation, viewing all living things—sun, moon, wind, water, fire, and earth—as brothers and sisters that give praise to God simply by being themselves. Francis' view of creation as a gift from God, inspires a sense of gratitude and responsibility for its care. Our annual Season of Creation provides a dedicated time for us to reflect on God's relationship with creation and inspire care for the planet.

The 800th anniversary of the Canticle serves as a timely opportunity to rekindle the vision of the Canticle and apply it to today's challenges, such as climate change and pollution. We hope to foster with one another, a renewed commitment to stewardship of creation.

The Open Door and its mission to provide nutritious food to the families of Cape Ann has increased over the past year. Since August 2024, in addition to clients already receiving services, The Open Door has registered 820 new households for services at its Gloucester and Ipswich food pantry locations: An average of 68 new families per month.
